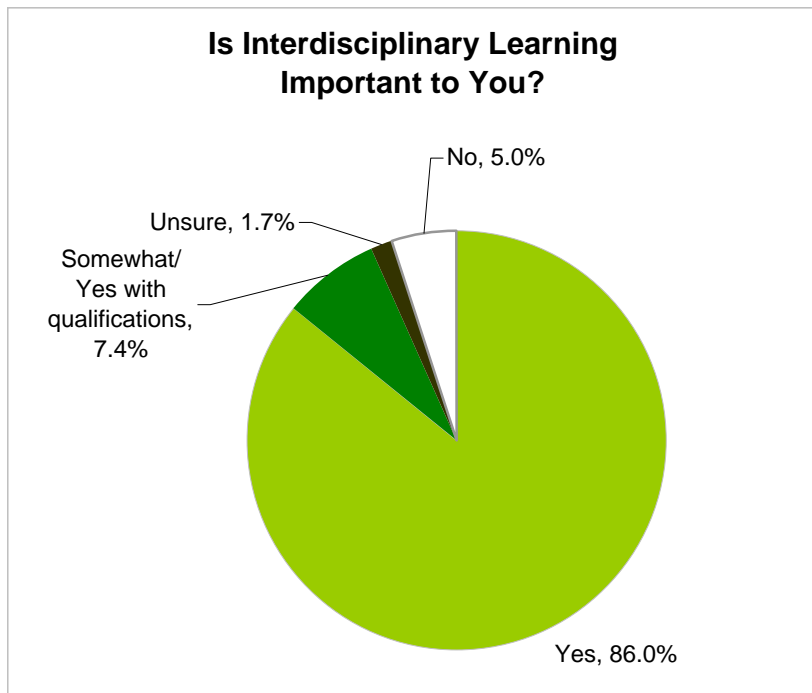
Importance of interdisciplinary learning

Need more 4 and 8 cr classes, need more half time programs/FT programs limit options, flexibility (N=2)

Not especially in the sense that I would like to be able to take other courses along with the one I'm already in with art doing Evening and Weekend.

Not really, I can make the connections between subjects without having them taught to me through interdisciplinary learning. I feel the program system at Evergreen provides students with the only option of taking a class a few faculty want to teach, rather than taking subjects they want to take. I, for example am interested in the arts, and literary theory.
