The Evergreen State College, Office of Sexual Assault Prevention was created to provide culturally sensitive and appropriate services and support to survivors of sexual assault.

Some of the services include:

- Information about reporting procedures and what to expect;
- Accompaniment to any/all campus appointments associated with reporting or resources.
- Legal advocacy, assistance with protective orders;
- Emergency crisis intervention, counseling and referrals;
- Counseling for the victim's partner, spouse or family;
- Assistance in accessing community resources;
- Services specific to traditionally under-served groups;
- Information about sexually transmitted diseases , HIV and pregnancy testing.
- Medical advocacy
- Education and prevention programs designed to increase awareness and reduce risk.

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23RD ANNUAL STUDENTS OF COLOR CONFERENCE

"Awakening Your Inner Scholar: Legacy, Resilience, Action"

Thursday – Saturday, April 11 through April 13, 2013

YAKIMA, WASHINGTON

This is an invitation to attend a fantastic educational conference in WA state.

This conference brings together students of color who attend higher education institutions in Washington State. It provides opportunities for students to develop leadership skills and strategies to empower themselves personally, culturally, and academically. There will be workshops, speakers, & other leadership opportunities for multicultural students.

At this time students from APIC are currently trying to secure funds to attend this conference (which may include some fund-raising). In order to make the timeline of deadlines we have to send out this application very early. If you are chosen to attend and are offered S and A funds to attend, all meals, lodging and conference registration will be covered except for a 25 dollar fee from each student which will go to travel.

This conference is sponsored by the Washington State Multicultural Services Directors' Council and is supported by APIC, S & A, KEY and First Peoples Advising Services

Registration Information:

Before you apply, PLEASE BE AWARE that:

The conference takes place during the week and the weekend of April 11 through the 13th in Spring. This means that you need to check your program schedule and make sure you can attend. If you do not know what that schedule is then you need to be sure you make arrangements for letting your instructor know as soon as possible about your plans to attend the conference.

There is a nominal fee to attend the conference. Students are responsible for paying this when they are notified that their application has been selected. If students do not hand in their fee by the deadline, an alternate student will be given that space.

There is a required Orientation meeting which you must attend. This will be held on April 3rd from 3pm to 4:30pm.

You will be sharing a room with up to 3 other students, 2 students per bed. Room assignments are given at the required Orientation meeting. When possible, we give students choices about whom they will room with.

Application Directions:

Complete the following application and submit to Raquel at FPAS (L 2135). Make sure you answer each question fully and clearly. A committee of staff and students will review and select 25 students to go based on the quality of the responses given. Preferences will be given to students who are willing to help develop and present workshops at the conference.

Deadline:

When your application is complete, please submit for processing NO LATER THAN Wednesday, February 6, 2013 at noon.

Fee:

If selected to attend the conference a \$25 deposit is due Monday, February 18. Disclaimer: Deposit is non-refundable and will be used to help pay for travel expenses. *(Continued on next page)*

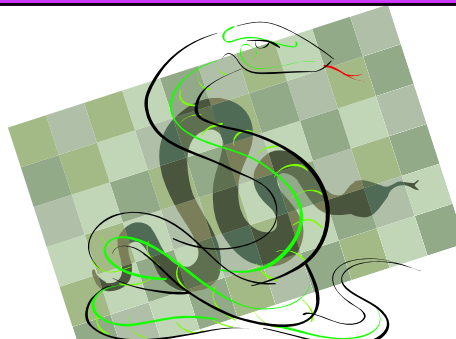

Year of The Snake



Lunar New Year, also known as LNY, Chinese New Year or Spring Festival, is a traditional festival to celebrate the beginning of the year in lunar calendar. It is considered one of the most important festivals for Chinese and Chinese descendants around the world. This festival is celebrated from the first day until the fifteenth day of the first month in Chinese lunar calendar.

Since Lunar New Year is determined by using lunar calendar, the date of the festival varies from year to year in Gregorian calendar. Some Asian countries celebrate Lunar New Year as a public holiday, yet, the period of holidays varies in each country.

Different countries recognize different names of Lunar New Year. It is known as Chinese New Year and Spring Festival in China, Japanese New Year in Japan, Korean New Year or Seollal (Seolnal) in Korea, Vietnamese New Year or Tet in Vietnam, Losar in Tibet, Tsagaan Sar in Mongol, Imlek in Indonesia, and many other names in different countries.

This year, the Day of Absence will take place on Wednesday, April 25th and Friday, April 27th. (For those of you who may be unfamiliar with this yearly observance, check our FPAS website and read a brief history of the ideas behind our tradition at the end of this newsletter.)

Day of Absence was founded by Dr. Maxine Mims and other African American faculty as a revolutionary act. It has been celebrated at Evergreen since the mid 70's. Since then it has grown to become an off-campus educational and rejuvenating retreat which all of Evergreen's students, staff and faculty of color are invited to attend. In addition, while the community of color is off-campus, white allies offer a full day of programming on campus around identity development and anti-oppression work. The concept has grown to include the Day of Presence programming which represents the reuniting of our entire community and an opportunity to share ideas with each other as allies around the issues of multiculturalism and community strength.

Although there have been many changes and additions over the years, the purpose of these Days is to invite the entire campus community to celebrate and to explore the richness of our diversity by participating in dialogue, activities, workshops, seminars, performances and perspectives. Every year new and different programming is developed by the Day of Absence and Day of Presence Planning Committee which is comprised of students, staff and faculty.

At present, the planning committee is open to new members and we would love for you to lend us your time and energy to help us plan great programs for the coming year.
