Meet EL'ona

Scholarship recipient highlight

For someone who has written five books,

run for government office, and started her own business, it's hard to believe there was a time when EL'ona Kearney thought she was not smart enough to go to college.

EL'ona came to Evergreen following a non-traditional path that started in the military. When she tried to enter civilian life and explore college, she had to withdraw after one of her young children was hurt while with a caregiver. She dedicated herself to raising her children, only returning to school after they were grown. In an effort to break the cycle of shattered dreams within her family, she returned to college with the goal of obtaining an Associate degree (AA). However, she surpassed not only her parents and ancestors, but also her initial expectations by continuing her education and ultimately graduating with a bachelor's degree (BA) in business from Evergreen.

When a counselor—a former Greener themself—encouraged EL'ona to attend The Evergreen State College, EL'ona was admitted and flourished. "It truly felt like the staff and faculty were my

cheerleaders," says EL'ona, "If you said you needed resources, they would take the time to help you find them." EL'ona appreciated how Evergreen catered to different learning styles, something she needed when returning to school after years of being away.

Creating leaders and doing public good

During her time at Evergreen, EL'ona was the recipient of the Foundation Scholarship as well as the American Legion Post 3 Scholarship. She was also the Art of Giving 2022 keynote speaker and highlighted how Evergreen gave her a voice for public good to uplift veterans and veteran mothers. The scholarships that EL'ona received while in school gave her more chances to visualize and work on her dream of creating a more equitable society. For one of her independent learning credits, she received a distinguished congressional internship position and spoke on State Bill 5000, which has since become law, and which recognizes the contributions of Americans of Chinese descent. Fueled by her own experience, she also helped bring forth a bill to expand the ways parents can use vouchers to pay for safe, affordable childcare.

EL'ona graduated in 2022 from Evergreen with a bachelor's degree emphasizing business. Today, she takes the tools and experiences she had during her Evergreen education to make them available for everyone. She started her own business as a forgiveness coach, and wrote several books about her life, setting boundaries, and being the best version of yourself. Through this work, she hopes to inspire youth to break unhealthy family cycles and grow to be better.

In 2021, EL'ona ran for SeaTac city council and placed 3rd in the general elections. Continuing this dream, EL'ona hopes to hold a position in government where she can make even more of a difference in her community and build a better future for her family. "Evergreen boosted my confidence and gave me a platform," EL'ona explained, "I hope that I can create and inspire a more unified world for todays and future youth."

Meet Kwabi Alumni highlight

While at The Evergreen State College Tacoma, Kwabi found his calling.

If you've spent time in Tacoma, WA, there is a good chance you've seen the powder blue 1988 Mitsubishi van with the name "Peace Bus" on the side being driven by Kwabi Amoah-Forson '15.

Started in 2017 by Kwabi through inspiration from his time at Evergreen Tacoma and support from academic advisors like Peter Bacho, the Peace Bus began as a local project to deliver messages of peace and humanitarian aid. Now the Tacoma native is taking his message across the globe.

"My job is to campaign for peace like it is a product," says Kwabi, "To get people interested in peace, to make it trend. Because if people don't hear about it or aren't invigorated by it, how can we spread it?"

House of Welcome

Anniversary highlight



The House of Welcome was the first facility of its kind to be built on a

public college campus in the Unted States and was a dream of Native students, tribal artists and faculty member Mary Ellen Hillaire from the Lummi Nation, who founded Evergreen's Native American Studies program in 1972.

In 1995 their dream came true thanks to the perseverance of Evergreen graduate Colleen Jollie '92 and since that time, the mission of Evergreen's s'gwi gwi?altxw: House of Welcome has been to promote Indigenous arts and cultures from not only the Pacific Northwest but internationally.

Since its founding, s'gwi gwi?altxw: House of Welcome has hosted over 200 artists residencies and workshops; it has premiered 15 art exhibitions; sent six Northwest Native American artists to New Zealand for residencies; and hosted two international artists gatherings.

In 2022, s'gwi gwi?altxw: House of Welcome celebrated 25+ years of service, paving the way for Native students and artists to achieve success.

Artists are luminaries of their cultures, lighting the pathway back into the far reaches of history, and leading the way into the future with their creative vision.
